During his childhood Dr. Majid developed a passion and determination to study veterinary medicine and now he is not only the Chief vet officer in the UAE, but also the director of the animal development and health department of the food diversity sector in the Ministry of Climate Change and Environment.

Dr. Al Qassimi was delighted to be chosen as a speaker this year. He presented the topic "Sustainability on the Edge" addressing the daily habits that affect the ecosystem, providing solutions that broaden the students edge of knowledge and therefore shifting the mindset of students towards developing sustainable habits. In his respected opinion, Jane Goodall's Roots & Shoots programme in the UAE is so important to be able to reach as many young people as possible. "I believe that education is the first step to ensuring sustainability. The younger we can have this conversation the more we can grow and develop sustainability here and across the World".

Dr. Majid is determined to educate the future generation on the importance of sustainability in our lives. Give A Ghaf Tree Planting

Last month, the Give a Ghaf Service Kashtah brought together 60 student volunteers from around the UAE for a day of learning about sustainability in the desert environment. Through this educational day trip, students worked together to plant 250 of the UAE's national Ghaf Tree seeds at Dubai Al Barari Nursery to support the founding father's vision of transforming the desert into a green haven. The Goumbook's Give a Ghaf conservation program is important to the desert environment because Ghaf Trees serve as the basis of whole miniature ecosystems relying on their shade, seed pods, and leaves, and only require 5 litres of water per day where as palm trees guzzle up to 300.



The Great Nurdle Hunt

So what in the world is a Nurdle? Nurdles are small plastic pellets used in the manufacturing of plastic products. Due to spills and mishandling, they often end up in the ocean, causing harm to marine life. The Great Nurdle Hunt is a fun & educational event held in collaboration with Arabella Willing, Park Hyatt Saadiyat Head of Conservation, where volunteers compete in teams to collect nurdles from the Saadiyat beach in this unique variation of a beach clean up, while learning about the impact of plastic pollution on our environment.

Last April, volunteers from NYUAD collected over 5,000 nurdles in just one clean up!

We held another event on November 24th, if you want to join us save the date for the next NYUAD Nurdle Hunt Service Kashtah on February 16th 2019.

NYUAD environmental student leader Killian Dumont shared, "Working with Roots & Shoots has been such an amazing opportunity to connect with young students in the UAE and to expand and explore my interest in environmental outreach and education. Every time we work with Roots & Shoots schools I am inspired by the excitement and energy that the students bring to the NYUAD campus and this energy pushes me to work even harder to develop and contribute to NYUAD's environmental programming."

Team Zayed shares their Antarctica Journey

After the Antarctica expedition earlier this year, Winston Cowie and Rashed Al Zaabi from Team Zayed, Environment Agency, decided to visit schools to share their magnificent experience in Antarctica with groups of students from grade (4-6). The theme was "Say no to single use of plastics".

The aim was to inspire, educate, and engage students on the UAE's Terrestrial and Marine Biodiversity, Antarctica, and society's two largest environmental challenges: Climate Change & Single Use Plastic. Winston, as a marine specialist initiated the session by showing some of the rare marine biodiversity. Rashed followed by showing off some terrestrial biodiversity. Then, the level of excitement elevated as soon as Zayed's team talked about their Adventure and challenges throughout the trip to Antarctica, inspiring the students to follow in their footsteps! Dunes International School is committed to impart the quality education through an environment that exudes trust and excellence. They encourage children to take up new challenges and be the best possible version of themselves in all aspects of life, to make a difference. In every student, they develop an active and creative mind by working alongside environmental and sustainability projects.

Highlights of some recent school activities:

Hydroponics is a subset of hydroculture, the method of growing plants using mineral nutrient solutions in water solvent. Dunes International school recognizes the bright future of hydroponics and provided hands-on experiential learning opportunities to the students in the school. Through this project students acquired an important life skill of growing food with limited resources. Such practices are helpful in deserts like the UAE.

Vertical garden: School gardens are a wonderful way to use the schoolyard as a classroom, reconnect students with the natural world and the true source of their food, and teach them valuable gardening and agriculture concepts and skills that integrate with several subjects Dunes International School took an initiative to build a vertical garden with the students' involvement.

Fixing up Bird Feeders: Making a bird feeder is a wonderful opportunity to observe bird habitats and their needs in their natural environment. Students made coconut shell bird feeders to welcome the birds that are hungry, thirsty and nesting. Children fixed these coconut shells on the branches of trees in the school garden and also the trees outside school premises.

News paper bag distribution: In order to show their respect and love towards Mother Earth in a befitting manner, students from Kindergarten to Grade 11 learnt to think globally and act locally by participating in designing paper bags with the help of parents and distributing News Paper bags to restaurants and groceries.

Bio-Gas operation: Students from Grade 10 and 11 participated in Bio-Gas operation, installed at school, and prepared group projects on the topics "Bioremediation and Biodegradable alternatives" and "Innovative ways to beat Plastic Pollution.

Abu Dhabi Homeschoolers Association (ADHSA)

FEATURED GROUP

ADHSA is the Abu Dhabi Homeschoolers Association and counts 37 families as registered members, totalling 84 students of different ages. At ADHSA we take raising responsible and compassionate future citizens very seriously. Therefore, we strive to teach our students to value the natural environment that surrounds them and contribute to the wider community that they live in. To that end we organise field trips and educational activities throughout the year to highlight how human actions can lead to climate change, habitat destruction and biodiversity loss. We also teach our children skills and values that will enable them to grow up as compassionate leaders dedicated to humanitarian work, responsible living, sustainability and conservation.

We have undertaken numerous projects to raise awareness of sustainability challenges, drawn attention to conservation work and improve understanding of the complexity of the natural environment that surrounds us. These projects include a series of kayaking expeditions to explore and learn more about local mangrove forests. The 'School Without Walls' program culminated in ADHSA holding a poster competition, with winning images being printed on reusable shopping bags for their members. To promote sustainable living they held an organic soil workshop, teaching members how building and maintaining healthy soils is critical for a sustainable future. This was further supported by a visit to a local organic farm to educate the children about responsible farming.

Furthermore, ADHSA students paid

a visit to Al Wathba Wetlands reserve as part of their environmental studies. They explored the biodiversity of the Al Wathba Wetlands reserve on a guided tour, observed diverse vegetation, looked for the reserve's inhabitants and learned to recognize some of them. The participants learned about the diversity of UAE habitats and looked at sabhka salt flats, saline lakes and tall-reed marshes in detail. More importantly, they also learned about the threats facing these habitats and the need for conservation work to preserve bio-diversity.

Following the trip to Al Wathba, ADHSA held a beach clean up at the **Emirates Marine Environmental** Group. During the day they learned about the environmental pressures and challenges caused by human activities. In addition they found out more about the conservation projects run by EMEG. The students contributed to EMEG conservation efforts by helping to clean the beach and came away with lots of fond memories and a better understanding of conservation needs.

In their most recent project ADHSA members' explored different ways to reuse and recycle plastic after learning how much damage plastic refuse causes to the environment. Students collected and then reused plastic caps from plastic bottles by creating a bottle cap mural.

They hope that sharing these experiences will help today's children become well informed and responsible future global citizens, ready to tackle tomorrow's problems. Mad Hatters Nursery, UK – never too young to make a positive difference!

Mad Hatters nursery is fortunate enough to have a wonderful outdoor space, home to two beautiful, white rabbits called Marshmallow and Sweetie, and filled with lots of children's toys, swings and Wendyhouses. Looking after the rabbits and any other insects found in the play area is encouraged.

Throughout the year the little ones regularly check their digging patch and bug hotel for new guests. Pieces of bark, wood and stone are collected and added to the bug hotel so it's forever being extended to make room for more guests. Black Beetles, woodlice, spiders, centipedes, wasps, bees, ants and worms are often in residence.

A while back, a small child took one of the teacher's hands and led her to a puddle where they found a bee struggling to float in the water. *'Mrs Casey, we need to rescue him!*' the child exclaimed. The teacher carefully let the bee climb onto the palm of her hand where its wings started to dry and it
